What about Noah? Was He convinced or convicted?





Noah's faith became evident: He was Convicted!

This morning I want to diagnose the cardiology of worldliness.



How does one define worldliness?



 Worldliness is a love for this fallen world and the things in it. It is loving the values and pursuits of the world that stand opposed to God.

What does it mean to be worldly?

- Does it mean I can't go watch a R-rated movie?
- Do I have to change my music habits?
- Does it mean I have to change my clothing?
- What about luxury vacations or 2nd homes?
- Does it mean I shouldn't desire a new car?





We all know the questions. Here's the real question...do we honestly want the answers to these questions?



In addressing worldliness most Christians focus on the "externals." But the root of the issue of worldliness is a heart issue.



"Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that *is* in the world—the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—is not of the Father but is of the world." 1 John 2:15-16

Enlarging upon this concept of what is "in the world," notice John doesn't say, "worldliness is this particular mode of dress, this way of speaking, this music, these possessions."

No, instead he focuses on three things: the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life.



As we begin to truly consider worldliness we realize the evil of our desires often lies not in what we want, but in the fact that we want it too much—so much that it affects our relationship with God.



There is this sense in America that you can be a true Christian and have an deep burning for the world.




Imagine I take a blind test in which my task is to identify the follower of Christ (you) vs. someone in the world.




I'm given two reports detailing things like: conversations Internet activity iPod playlists manner of dress, television/movie habits leisure time financial transactions thoughts passions hobbies dreams...

The question is: Would I be able to tell you apart?
Would I be able to discern a difference between you and your unconverted neighbor, coworker, classmate, or friend?



Worldliness does not offer you a future!





Few things are as dangerous in your home as a love for the world. If you train your children to be friends of the world then according to this Scripture they are enemies of God.






Consider Demas

How can we love the very things for which Christ was crucified?





Can you love the nails?

Because when you say you are a disciple of Christ, yet love the world you do that very thing!








Worldliness and Media

Consider the life in the typical American home.



The hazard is thoughtless watching.


\$215 Billion is spent annually on television commercials. (From an anti-God world!)

Time Questions

- `Am I skipping or delaying something important in order to watch this now?
- What are my other social/entertainment options besides watching television or going out to see a movie?
- How much time have I already spent on media today?
- How much time have I spent surfing the internet or on social media today?
- In the last week, how much time have I spent on spiritual growth, building relationships, or serving at church compared to time spent consuming media?
- After investing the time to view this, will I look back on it as time well spent?



Heart Questions

- Why do I want to watch this program or film? What do I find entertaining about it?
- Am I seeking to escape from something that I should be facing by watching this? Am I seeking comfort or relief that can only be found in God?
- What sinful temptations will this program or film present?
- Do I secretly want to view something in it that is sinful?
- Am I watching this because I'm bored or lazy? What does that reveal about my heart?
- Am I watching this simply because other people are?
 Am I trying to be relevant or to fit in?



Content Questions


- What worldview or philosophy of life does this program or film present? What is the view of man? What is the view of sin?
- What does this program or film glamorize? What is valued or considered important?
- Is sin shown as having negative consequences?
- What is the sexual content?
- Would seeing this help me better understand God's world?
- Will I benefit in any way from watching this or visiting this website?
- Is the language in this film glorifying to God?



Drifting toward worldliness may be slow, its symptoms not immediately apparent. This drift is usually a sign of a dulling conscience.

"Now the Spirit expressly says that in latter times some will depart from the faith, giving heed to deceiving spirits and doctrines of demons, speaking lies in hypocrisy, having their own conscience seared with a hot iron,"

 Listening to music without discernment and godly intent reveals a heart willing to flirt with the world.

Ephesians 5:3-12

But fornication and all uncleanness or covetousness, let it not even be named among you, as is fitting for saints; neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor coarse jesting, which are not fitting, but rather giving of thanks. For this you know, that no fornicator, unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and God. Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of these things the wrath of God comes upon the sons of disobedience. Therefore do not be partakers with them.

For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness, righteousness, and truth), finding out what is acceptable to the Lord. And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather expose them. For it is shameful even to speak of those things which are done by them in secret.


Worldliness and Stuff


From "Dangerous Curves Ahead"


